The Cold War dominated US foreign relations and had tremendous repercussions for the globe in the latter half of the twentieth century. Though it has been over twenty years since the collapse of the Soviet Union, legacies of the Cold War remain with us today. Massive nuclear arsenals, a byproduct of the Cold War arms race, to this day remain on hair-trigger alert, capable of launching on warning within fifteen minutes. The legacy of an unpopular war in Vietnam has shaped both American foreign policy and the political language in which opposition is expressed. Controversial mottos such as "In God We Trust" and "Under God," originally introduced to distinguish America from its atheistic Soviet counterparts, not only remain with us, but have been reaffirmed in recent years. Simply put, the Cold War has great relevance for our present society politically, socially, culturally, and beyond.

This class will examine the Cold War mostly from an American-centric position. In so doing, I will strive to show the Cold War as more than just a clash between two competing superpowers over opposite economic and ideological philosophies, but as an axis upon which American politics, culture, and society revolved around. Along the way, we will encounter not just American politicians (such as President Truman and Senator Joseph McCarthy), but famous Soviet leaders (such as Joseph Stalin, Nikita Khrushchev, and Mikhail Gorbachev). We will cover the role of third world nationalists, such as Ho Chi Minh of Vietnam, Colonel Nasser of Egypt, and Fidel Castro of Cuba. This course will also explore the relationship between the Cold War and social movements, from the Civil Rights campaign, to the Vietnam antiwar movement, and various antinuclear campaigns. These movements will give students a sense of how ordinary citizens responded to, were influenced by, and, ultimately, shaped events and outcomes of the Cold War.

Since history by its nature can be wrought with politics, much of what we will discuss will be inherently political. Therefore, it is crucial to show respect for your peers, and particularly for those ideas you may not agree with. Disagree with respect—this is an academic setting, not talk radio. As an additional sign of respect, please turn your cell phone off or set to silent. Also, do not send texts, take out a PSP, listen to an iPOD, or some alternative electronic means of distracting yourself from lecture! Class is just over an hour long, your iPhone (et. al.) will not curse you for neglecting it during class. (On the other hand, use of it in the class may in fact curse your grade!) If you bring your laptop to take notes, please avoid hanging out on Facebook or whatever other social network the cool kids are using these days. Bottom line: use common sense.

Prerequisites:

This class assumes a general working knowledge of twentieth century world and U.S. history. As such, students are expected to have completed one of the following courses: Hist 2C, 4C, or 17C. Exceptions to this will be made on a case-by-case basis.

Grades

Broadly speaking, this is how I will define each of the following course grades:

- A You did everything I could possibly ask of you, and you did it extremely well. You worked very hard, learned a great deal, and showed conspicuous intelligence. The quality of your work was outstanding.
- B You did all the work, and you did it well. You worked hard and learned a good deal. The quality of your work was good.
- C You did all the work. It is clear that you learned a number of things, though those things may not hang together in a systematic and critical understanding of the course material. The quality of your work was adequate.
- D You did most of the work, including all the major course requirements. You may have learned some things, but it is not clear that you learned anything important. The quality of your work was less than adequate.
- F You have demonstrated an obstinate ignorance. You did not complete the course requirements. You have proved unwilling or unable to do college level work in this subject area

Extra credit opportunities:

Book reviews will be worth 2% extra credit each, while article reviews will be worth 1%. As a bonus, any student who reviews three books can receive up to 6% extra credit. Please run all books or articles through me first. Articles should be from peer-reviewed journals such as *Cold War History*, *The Journal of Cold War Studies*, *Diplomatic History*, or *The Journal of American History*. Note: no assigned reading can be reviewed for extra credit. A short list of books relevant to the course will be posted to the course website on Gauchospace. Book reviews should be 600-900 words (~2 - 3 pages), whereas an article review should be about 300 words (~1 page).

Note on Plagiarism:

Don't do it. Plagiarism is using another person's words or ideas and presenting them as if they were your own. It is the worst crime you can commit in the intellectual world. If you are unsure about what plagiarism is or whether you have transgressed, ask me. If you plagiarize and are caught—and you will be caught—you will fail the course and your name will be turned over to the Dean of Undergraduate Study for disciplinary action, which can include expulsion from the university.
